In the summer of 1900, 56 American sailors and marines were part of an international guard defending Beijing's Legation Quarter against imperial

Chinese soldiers and "Boxers," members of a secret society determined to rid China of foreign influence. Relief of the quarter required additional U.S. sailors, marines, and soldiers to join a multinational force against the numerically superior Chinese. The conflict was the U.S. military's first taste of coalition warfare on the global stage. This monograph tracks the critical role of the U.S. Navy and Marine Corps in both the defense of the Legation Quarter and in the campaign that led to its relief.


